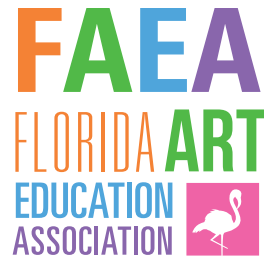

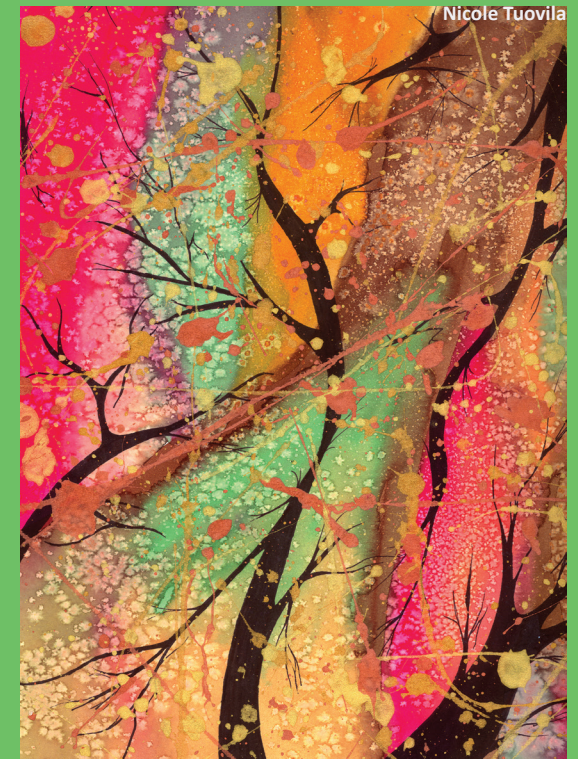

Getting Involved

Students involved in the visual arts throughout high school had higher Grade Point Averages (GPA), lower drop out rates, and higher graduation rates.

38% Higher Graduation Rate

Students with no visual art credits in high school graduated with a diploma **67%** of the time. However, high school art students had a graduation rate over **93%**.

15% Higher GPA

Students involved in visual arts throughout high school had average GPAs exceeding **3.0 GPA** as compared to student with no arts classes averaging GPAs below 2.6.

Lower Drop Out Rate

The student drop out rate for students engaged in the visual arts for four years in high school is below 7%.

These students are more likely to stay in school than their non-artistically engaged counterparts.

Academic Performance

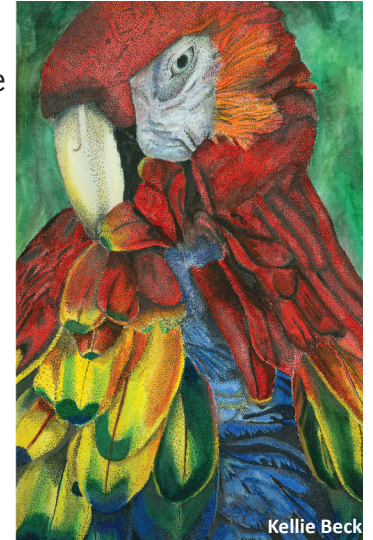
FCAT

Art is not a FCAT tested subject. Art students DO, however, score higher, on average, than non-art students. The longer they are enrolled in art classes, the higher their FCAT scores.

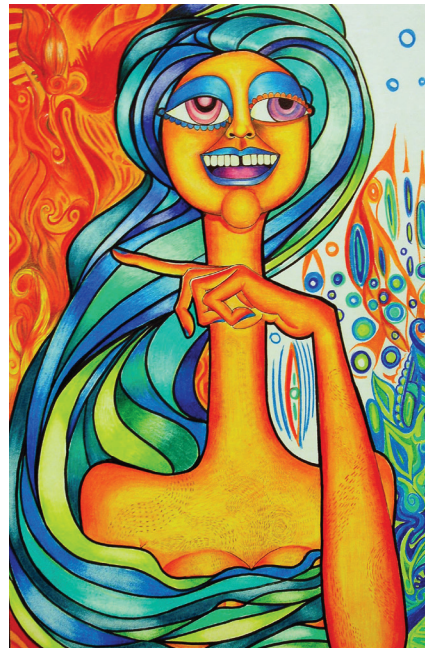
81.89% of students involved in visual arts throughout high school scored a **3 or higher** on FCAT math.

90% increase in students scoring a **3 or higher** on FCAT reading when the student had 4 art credits or more as opposed to none.

83.9% of four year high school students scored a **3.5 or higher** on FCAT writing.

SAT

There is a strong correlation between regular involvement in visual arts and improved test scores.

The correlation extends through all socioeconomic classification and students with disabilities.

High school art students on a free and/or reduced lunch price program averaged **33 points** higher on the SAT Math and **51 points** higher on the SAT Verbal than students with no art credits.

High school art students, compared to students with no art credits, average **3.4%** higher on SAT Math and **7.4%** higher on SAT Verbal.
